Dear Mr. Chairman:

This briefing report summarizes information on the use of consultants and experts by the Immediate Office of the Secretary (IOS), Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) during Margaret M. Heckler's tenure as Secretary (March 7, 1983, to December 13, 1985) and the extent that consultants and experts had been used throughout the Department during that same period. This information was requested in your May 17, 1985, letter and in a December 16, 1985, meeting with a representative of the subcommittee. In a September 25, 1986, briefing on the results of our work, the subcommittee representative said that a written report would be useful to the subcommittee in exercising its responsibilities with respect to HHS, even though Mrs. Heckler was no longer Secretary.

SCOPE AND METHODOLOGY

To respond to your request, we identified, from a listing of IOS personnel supplied by HHS, consultants and experts hired under the provisions of 5 U.S.C. 3109 (the governmentwide authority for employment of experts and consultants). Through discussions with the subcommittee representative, we learned that consultants and experts appointed under this authority were your primary concern. This authority does not include consultant services obtained through contractual arrangements. We accepted the HHS listing as complete without further verification. We then reviewed the official personnel folders of 29 of the 32¹ consultants and experts

The official personnel folders for all 32 consultants and experts were requested from HHS, but 3 could not be located. We were able to obtain some information on these three consultants from other sources such as the listing of IOS personnel. identified from the listing² to determine the services they were to perform, the period or periods of service, and the previous employment of the consultants and experts. We also asked HHS to respond in writing to questions dealing with such matters as how HHS monitored the performance of IOS consultants and experts, products they produced, how time and attendance reports were certified, and total costs to the government of each of the IOS consultants and experts, including support costs. We did not verify the accuracy or completeness of the written responses.

We also obtained information from HHS' automated payroll system on amounts paid to consultants and experts throughout HHS for calendar years 1983,³ 1984, and 1985.

Our audit work, which took place from June 1985 through October 1986, was done in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards except as noted above.

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²Five of these consultants were appointed before Mrs. Heckler became Secretary of HHS but served during her tenure.

³For calendar year 1983, HHS was only able to provide compensation information on consultants and experts still on the payroll at the end of the year. Similar information on consultants and experts who had worked and left during 1983 was not available.

EMPLOYMENT OF CONSULTANTS AND EXPERTS BY IOS

Of the 32 consultants and experts⁴ employed in IOSduring Mrs. Heckler's tenure, 16 were employed solely as consultants or experts, and had not previously or did not subsequently hold other appointments in IOS. The others either (1) held noncareer appointments during the previous Secretary's tenure and were converted to consultants or experts either shortly before or after Mrs. Heckler became Secretary; (2) held temporary appointments in IOS immediately prior to serving as consultants or experts; (3) held noncareer appointments in IOS during Mrs. Heckler's tenure, resigned those positions and were subsequently hired as consultants or experts; or (4) in the most common situation (eight instances), served as consultants or experts immediately prior to their appointment to noncareer positions. According to HHS, the 32 consultants and experts in IOS were paid a total of \$757,879 in salary and benefits and \$91,940 for travel, lodging, and meals while serving in IOS during Mrs. Heckler's tenure.

Services performed by IOS Consultants and Experts

The Federal Personnel Manual and HHS instructions on the employment of experts and consultants say that statements of duties must be sufficiently detailed to show that the services to be rendered are ones for which it is appropriate to use the expert/consultant appointment

⁴The Federal Personnel Manual, issued by the Office of Personnel Management, and AHHS Instruction 304-1/ on "Appointment of Experts and Consultants" define a consultant as a person who serves in an advisory capacity as distinguished from a person who carries out the Department's duties and responsibilities. He or she gives views or opinions on problems or questions but does not perform, or supervise the performance of, operating functions. Consultants are to be persons with a high degree of competence. Their expertise may derive from broad administrative, professional, or technical experience which makes their advice of distinctive value to the Department. An expert is defined as a person with excellent qualifications and a high degree of attainment in a professional, scientific, technical, or other field. The individual's attainment is to be such that he or she usually is regarded as an authority, or as a person of unusual competence by others in the profession, occupation, or activity.

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authority. However, the descriptions of services to be performed by the IOS consultants and experts were very general, without enough explanation to show that the consultants and experts were needed.

Appendix I summarizes the statements of duties for each of the IOS consultants and experts as well as their periods of service, cost, and available employment history.

HHS responses to questions

We asked HHS a series of questions about controls over IOS consultant and expert appointments and the services rendered. The written responses received were general. For example, in response to a question asking what products or documents each of the consultants and experts produced, HHS replied:

"Services of appointees were limited to providing specialized opinions, views or advice on a variety of issues of importance to the Secretary and the Administration. The specific duties performed were those shown on the individual HHS Forms 410 'Supplemental Information-Expert or Consultant.'⁶ No examples of work products are available." (Footnote added)

In response to a question asking how IOS determined that consultants and experts were satisfying work requirements when responsibilities under their appointments were not specifically detailed, HHS replied:

"Consultant's work requirements were satisfied through daily interaction with the Secretary and her key staff, and regular and intermittent meetings with them."

Appendix II includes all of the questions we asked HHS and its responses.

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⁶HHS Form 410 is required by HHS instructions to be completed when an expert or consultant appointment is made. One section of the form requires the preparer to "explain in full the services to be performed."

OVERALL USE OF CONSULTANTS AND EXPERTS IN HHS

During Mrs. Heckler's tenure as Secretary, about 1,800 consultants and experts were employed throughout HHS. About 1,400 of these were employed under the authority of 5 U.S.C. 3109 (the governmentwide authority for employment of experts and consultants) which limits appointments to temporary (1 year or less) or intermittent (not more than 130 days), or 42 U.S.C. 209(f) (an authority for appointment of consultants and experts to advise and assist in the operations of the Public Health Service).

About 400 were "special experts" employed by the National Institutes of Health (NIH) for such purposes as developing or evaluating new procedures, techniques, or programs; training existing staff in new techniques and procedures or providing critical or scarce expertise to a program or project. They were paid over \$29 million during Mrs. Heckler's tenure. NIH has statutory authority to hire special experts who have the needed "scientific or professional qualifications" without the usual limitations on number of days worked or period of service. We did not do any analysis of the compensation paid to these individuals.

According to information provided by HHS, the consultants and experts hired under the governmentwide authority and the authority for the Public Health Service were paid over \$5 million during calendar years 1983, 1984, and 1985. Information on the compensation paid these consultants and experts by the various units of HHS is included in appendix III.

As requested by your office, we did not obtain official comments from HHS on this report. However, the report was discussed with appropriate officials who stated that the report was accurate. Also, as arranged with your office, unless you publicly announce its contents earlier, we plan no further distribution until 30 days from the date of this report. At that time we will send

Other IOS or HHS employment: Received SES Noncareer appointment as Special Assistant to the Secretary on July 24,

1983; appointed Assistant Secretary for Management and Budget on October 2, 1983.

Second appointment: "Will provide the Secretary with additional access to the opinions and recommendations of health care providers and professionals as she deals with complex issues of medical policy. Additionally, the expert will provide the Secretary expertise in dealing with issues that reflect both the practical and human side of medicine."

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Consultant 29

First appointment: "Will provide the Secretary with an analysis of her presentations on HHS policies to assess message construction, audience analysis, and delivery. Will advise the Secretary on advanced techniques which will best communicate her position on health and human services issues."

Second appointment: "Will advise on the significance of the content of scientific and sociological literature on violence, homicide, suicide and other injuries among minority populations (Blacks, Hispanics, Native Americans, and Asian Pacific Islanders) to illustrate the disparity in health status."

Other IOS or HHS employment: None.

Previous employment:

--Teaching Assistant in department of philosophy of a university;

--Restaurant Manager, Laramie, Wyoming;

--Teaching Assistant in department of communication of a university.

Consultant 30

<u>Period of service and cost</u>: February 3, 1985, to May 26, 1985; \$14,846.

Services to be performed: "Will advise the Secretary on the legal ramifications surrounding the sensitive initiative known as the T-Bear Infection Control Program."

Also assist the Senior Advisor to the Secretary/Executive Officer in review of the FY84 and 85 budgets for the Immediate Office of the Secretary."

Other IOS or HHS employment: Schedule C appointment in IOS as Assistant to the Secretary for Special Programs from January 21, 1981, until appointment as consultant on April 17, 1983.

Other previous employment:

--Assistant Administrator for a United States Senator.

Consultant 32

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Period of service and cost: February 4, 1983, to July 19, 1983; \$28,598.

Services to be provided: No official personnel folder was available for review. This individual was Deputy Executive Assistant to the Secretary and then Executive Assistant to the Secretary (both SES noncareer positions) during most of the previous Secretary's tenure, and held the latter position at the time of the consultant appointment.

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HHS RESPONSES¹ TO GAO QUESTIONS ON USE OF CONSULTANTS AND EXPERTS IN IOS DURING MARGARET M. HECKLER'S TENURE AS SECRETARY

- Question: What products or documents did each of the consultants and experts produce? (Provide copies of any such products. If no products were produced, explain specifically what services were performed.)
- Response: Services of appointees were limited to providing specialized opinions, views, or advice on a variety of issues of importance to the Secretary and the Administration. The specific duties performed were those shown on the individual HHS Forms 410 "Supplemental Information - Expert or Consultant." No examples of work products are available.
- Question: Why were each of the consultants and experts used instead of regular government employees?
- Response: Consultants were used instead of regular government employees due to the nature of the assignments and the advisory services required by the Secretary. The Secretary's personal interest in programs of particular concern to her, and the Administration's priorities, required unique expertise on her immediate staff to be available to her at all times without the demands of priorities and activities of Operating Division program staff. These talents and capabilities could not be accommodated by the regular workforce.
- Question: Who in IOS certified the time and attendance reports submitted by each of the consultants and experts and upon what basis were these individuals able to make such certifications?
- Response: Time and attendance reports for IOS consultants were approved for the supervisor by the IOS Administrative Officer and Personnel Specialist based on personal knowledge, verification, and authorization by the Chief of Staff.

HHS's written responses to questions on use of consultants and experts in IOS were provided by the Assistant Secretary for Personnel Administration. Although the responses were sometimes incomplete or unclear, we did not obtain further elaboration or clarification since most of the people in IOS directly involved with the consultants were no longer at HHS.
